Rakistan: Delay in Pictorial Health Warning

On January 13, a news item appeared in the media regarding delaying in Pictorial Health Warning (PHW) to be printed on cigarette packs. Originally, the PHW was suppose to come in to force on Feb 01 and a notification was released on November 2009 stating the same but tobacco industry influence the government to gain more time as they claim they do have the "right technology" to print the PHW.

CTC-Pak, representing the civil society, wrote a protest letter to the Director of Tobacco Control Cell, Federal Ministry of Health where it was stated how the efforts for effective tobacco control made by the government and civil society were being sabotaged.

FCTC Article 6

Price and tax measures to reduce the demand for tobacco

- 1. The Parties recognize that price and tax measures are an effective and important means of reducing tobacco consumption by various segments of the population, in particular young persons.
- 2. Without prejudice to the sovereign right of the Parties to determine and establish their taxation policies, each Party should take account of its national health objectives concerning tobacco control and adopt or maintain, as appropriate, measures which may include:
 - (a) implementing tax policies and, where appropriate, price policies, on tobacco products so as to contribute to the health objectives aimed at reducing tobacco consumption; and
 - (b) prohibiting or restricting, as appropriate, sales to and/or importations by international travellers of tax- and duty-free tobacco products.
- 3. The Parties shall provide rates of taxation for tobacco products and trends in tobacco consumption in their periodic reports to the Conference of the Parties, in accordance with Article 21.

Subject: Delay in implementation of Pictorial Health Warnings on Cigarette Packs

Dear Sir,

With due respect, with reference to January 13th's press appearance regarding the delay in implementation of Pictorial Health Warnings (PHWs) on cigarette packs, in Daily Times (National News, Page –A3, Jan 13, 2010), the Ministry has delayed the decision till May. It is also said in the press release that this has been the influence of "cash-rich tobacco industry" over the ministry.

After the confirmation of this information on telephonic conversation with your respected self, the Coalition for Tobacco Control – Pakistan (CTC-Pak) is concerned over this sad turn of events. Tobacco Industry with the consent of the Ministry of Health have secretly managed to push back the efforts made by the civil society and Tobacco Control Cell (TCC) during the last one and a half year for introducing pictorial health warning on cigarette packs that were to be implemented by Feb 2010.

It may be mentioned here that in the process of drafting the technical details of the SRO on above subject, we, the civil society, being partners with the TCC among other stakeholders, were taken on board. The SRO was approved and published in the Gazette of Pakistan on November 6th, 2009. Even this document is still available on your cell's official website.

Yet, it is embarrassing that not only this decision seems to be taken back but the process has been kept so secret that no one learned about it till recently. This further assures tantamount of the Ministry of Health to playing with the health of people of Pakistan and its lack of commitment, not to mention the international obligation towards the enforcement for effective tobacco control in Pakistan.

CTC-Pak protest against the delay of implementation of the SRO as it fears this delay will further on infinite period and demand the Federal Minister for Health, Mr. Makhdoon Shahabuddin, Secretary Health, Mr. Khusnood Akhtar Lashari and your kind self to take notice of this issue and to take immediate actions to implement the Pictorial Health Wamings on cigarette packs as per original decision as well as avoiding bene fitting the tobacco industry and playing with the health of people of Pakistan.
